### **Banking Hub (Continued)**

Cash Access UK, the organisation set up to protect nationwide access to cash, has opened a new temporary Banking Hub in Syston. The temporary Banking Hub provides locals with access to banking services, while plans for the permanent Hub continue to make headway.

The temporary Hub is open Monday to Friday, 9.30am to 4.30pm. The temporary Hub will remain available until the new permanent Banking Hub opens.

It will offer a counter service operated by the Post Office, where customers of all major banks and building societies can carry out regular cash transactions every day of the week.

It also offers a Community Banker service where customers can talk to their own banking provider on their allocated day about more complicated issues - appointments not taken, just turn up.

Community Bankers will work on rotation, with a different bank or building society available on each day of the week:


Monday: Santander

Alongside today's news, Cash Access UK is pleased to confirm that a permanent location has been secured and the permanent Banking Hub will

be located at 1262 Melton Road, Syston (the former Santander premises). Cash Access UK will continue to keep the community up to date with the progress of the permanent Hub.

The Banking Hub team look forward to welcoming residents to the temporary Banking Hub and supporting them with their everyday banking needs. They will also be able to keep residents up to date with progress on the permanent Banking Hub.

The freedom of the town will be presented at the Syston Town Council Civic Reception on Friday 17 May 2024.





### Syston Town Council Declares Climate Emergency

At the first Full Council meeting following the summer recess, Syston Town Council voted unanimously to declare a Climate Emergency.

As one of the largest towns in Charnwood, as well as one of the largest town or parish councils in Leicestershire, it is important that we take a leading role in our area on the Climate and Nature Emergency. We seek to follow the lead of Leicestershire County Council's declaration and become a net-zero organisation by 2030 and a net zero town by 2045. Further, Syston Town Council has signed the Leicestershire Climate and Nature Pact to show our commitment to working together to combat climate change and ecological decline.

We cannot wait for national governments to change their policies, and so we must act independently. By demonstrating what local communities can achieve, we can push regional and national governments to meet their commitments. For the residents of Syston, and the rest of the UK, it is vital that councils commit to, and deliver, carbon neutrality of their operations as quickly as possible we want to be leading the way. It is our intention to beat the 2030 aim. whilst showing innovative ways of achieving this target.

It is our pledge to the residents of Syston to work with all parts of our community to enable them to match and better our efforts. We want to not only demonstrate what we can do, but share our successes with each other, other parishes, and anyone else who can benefit from our actions and best practice. To support this, Syston Town Council has joined the Communities Network Foundation, whose aim is to link local groups to support the sharing of information and earn from other councils and organisations about what has worked for them.

Syston Town Council wants to use this declaration as a starting point. We plan to place climate concerns as central to our decision-making processes. This will include:

- Work towards achieving net zero with Syston Town Council operations if possible by 2030.
- Pressuring planning matters to include emissions and nature commitments.
- Encouraging active public transport by looking for improvements and investments.
- Seek to improve and expand allotment availability
- Look to plant more, and plan the long-term replacement for removed, trees and hedges of Syston Town Council land.
- Facilitate activity by the community to reduce waste, increase re-use and maximise recycling.

This is not a limiting list, but the Council's first thoughts. We would encourage anyone who has suggestions or ideas about how, as a Town, we can deliver our ambitions around Climate and Nature to contact the council or councillors so we can bring together all the ideas and concerns of Syston residents.

Together we can deliver a greener, more sustainable Syston.

### Take fewer flights

Take a train rather than a plane for shorter journeys as it emits less carbon.


The Chapel will be open on Saturday 11th Armistice day and Sunday 12th November Remembrance Sunday.

### Report by Leicestershire County Cllr James Poland

September saw the opening of the new banking hub in Syston, a place where banking services are provided to people regardless of which bank they're with. Based temporarily at the Syston Community Centre, in the longer term it will be permanently based where Santander was on Melton Road and is run by the Post Office. This is a great new facility for the town and many thanks to the Town Council, Edward Argar MP and all those who made this happen.

Authorities and local communities working together on climate change Communities across Leicestershire are being given the chance to play their part in tackling climate change and help Leicestershire become a net zero county by 2045. More support has been made available to parish councils, community groups and residents who want to get involved and make a real difference with the creation of a new easy-to-use toolkit.

The online resource has been developed by the Green Living Leicestershire Partnership, of which Leicestershire County Council is a leading member. The toolkit aims to provide a starting point for Leicestershire groups to address net zero in their community and aligns to the Leicestershire Climate and Nature Pact. Including helpful tips and advice, the toolkit has been designed to help kick-start community action, including guidance on how to identify sources of carbon emissions in their local area, setting clear reduction targets, getting

the community involved in supporting initiatives, working with communities and signing up to the Leicestershire Climate and Nature Pact.

It is hoped the net zero toolkit will be a step in the right direction in supporting parishes and local businesses to reduce emissions and their carbon footprint. Fair funding talks with Minister as campaign continues
Council leaders have met local government minister, Lee Rowley MP, as part of a long-running campaign calling for fair funding. The positive

discussion follows constructive talks with the Chancellor, Jeremy Hunt, in Westminster which saw proposals set out for a pragmatic, temporary fix which would see Government put in an extra £350m to level up 32 of the lowest funded councils.

The meeting coincided with the publication of a council budget update which shows a £9m overspend this year as the costs of children's and adult social care rocket. Inflation, the National Living Wage and increasing pressures on vital services are driving up the council's costs and could push its budget shortfall over £100m by 2027. On Friday 15th September the County's Cabinet heard that intensive work is taking place focussing on managing future demand and close management of costs will continue to reduce the forecast overspend. The Leader of County Council Nick Rushton said:

"The latest financial forecast typifies the grim reality facing councils up and down the country. Let me be clear we're not about to issue a section 114 notice. We're super-efficient and pride ourselves on doing the best we can with the money we have, but spiralling costs are making it much harder to keep our head above water. With many other well run authorities also facing similar pressures, local government is reaching new territory. We have a credible solution which can be implemented quickly and the minister reassured us he would take our comments back to Government"

Leicestershire is the lowest funded county council in the country and has

long been calling for funding reform. After saving £250m since 2010, Leicestershire County Council is already a very lean organisation and cannot realistically carry on in its current form without financial help from government.

### Public Notice – Remembrance Sunday, 12 November 2023 LEST WE FORGET

A reminder to all Syston residents, visitors, local societies and voluntary organisations, that this years' Remembrance Sunday Parade and Service is on Sunday, 12 November.

The parade, led by a piper and drums will leave the Melton Road car park at 10.30 am followed by the Syston Scout at 10.40 am, and march along Melton Road to the War Memorial at Central Park where the service and Act of Remembrance will take place. As is customary, wreaths will be placed on and around the War Memorial.

Anyone who is in the armed forces with a Syston connection who is home on leave is invited to join the parade in the ranks of the British Legion, in or out of uniform.

Please note that the roads and Melton Road car park and parking bays along the route will be closed to traffic from the mini-island at the junction of Melton Road, High Street and Barkby Road, up to the War Memorial to allow the parade along Melton Road. All linked side roads along the route will also be closed or partially closed. Bus routes through Syston will be temporarily suspended/diverted.

All residents are invited to attend a short service at St Peter and St Paul Church after the parade. Refreshments will be served at The Malt House Suite and entertainment will be provided by the legendary Sarah Clarke who will singing all your favourite war time songs.

A short service and two minutes silence will be observed at the War Memorial on Saturday, 11 November from 10.45 am.

### **Syston Town Council - Litter Care Scheme**

As we are all too aware, litter is often a problem in Syston. It is a problem on parks, the streets and on natural areas such as country footpaths etc. We are however, lucky to have a number of altruistic volunteers who currently carry out litter picking in the town. But as we cannot ensure the level of litter picking will be maintained, and in order to engender more community spirit, Syston Town Council aim to (excuse the pun), pick up on this and encourage others to help is maintain a litter-free Town by proposing a three-point litter scheme (Litter Care) where we highlight the issue and encourage members of the public to engage with us to help keep Syston free of litter.

- Educate and encourage people NOT to drop litter in the first place (thereby risking a fine) and to use the bins provided.
- 2. Council request that more residents 'do their bit' by picking up litter and disposing of it correctly when they are out walking in the Town; regular walkers in the Town e.g. dog walkers could help as they get out and about in our parks especially. The council have a limited number of litter-picking sticks that can be borrowed on a long-term basis for any volunteers that come forward to help (a small deposit may be requested to ensure safe return).
- Council request that business owners and managers also help by ensuring that the front of their

premises are kept litter free. This will have the added benefit of helping the enterprise look smarter thereby potentially attracting more custom.

Where bins are found to be full and in need of emptying, people are encouraged to report this to either: Syston Town Council Litter Care (0116 260 7150), Charnwood Borough Council (01509 963 4563) or by using the Love Clean Streets App.

The Council do hope that members of the public and business owners will see the merits of our Litter Care Scheme and will come forward to help keep Syston tidy. Please call 0116 260 7150 or call in at the council offices on School Street to register your interest. Any help will be very much appreciated by not only Councillors but also residents and visitors to the town.





### **Syston Sequestration**

Thank you to those who provided us with pictures of exceptional trees, when we asked. These are trees that hold a special place in your heart. Syston has many trees dotted around, many have been here before the arrival of the car.

Sequestration is the term for carbon that is removed from the air and then stored in trees. It is used as a measure of the rate of carbon removal by a tree. With regard to the recent loss of the recent loss of the Sycamore Gap, did you know that the Sycamore is not classified as a native tree to the UK? Thought to be introduced either by the Romans or by persons unknown in the Middle Ages. Not being a native species, they are often overlooked, being seen by gardeners as a thug and contributing to tail delays due to their oily leaf sap. They have adapted well to our climate, are the third most important tree for pollution removal and carbon storage (after natives oak and ash) and are not subject to the vast range of pests and diseases currently affecting our native trees. Their characteristics include grey bark with palmate leaves, and winged seeds, which children refer to as 'helicopters'

In terms of sequestration, Leicestershire's sycamores remove 9.3 tonnes of carbon per year, while they are thought to store well over 25,000 tonnes of carbon. Sycamores can live to between 200 and 400 years. As well as being used by wildlife for food and shelter, including the sycamore aphid, their wood was once used to make welsh love spoons.

These sycamore are located on Wanlip Road after leaving the Hope & Anchor.

The scale and the valuable contribution the business and commercial sector make is not always understood nor publicised.

As a council we need to get to know and understand more about you and your needs.

The election of the new Town Council this year, has turned a cornerstone in Syston's future, Work continues to progress and to some extent the council's work will be challenging in the future as we implement changes and explore inventiveness.

One area where there is scope for us to develop and grow is with our connectivity and work with the

business and commercial sector. The relationships between local councils and businesses have always been essential to securing and sustaining a business voice to inform local views and location-based decisions to guide action to enable businesses to thrive where possible. The local town council needs to work with the local commercial and industry sector in a variety of ways and perhaps one way to begin is with the process of engagement. Subject to interest from the local sector, the Town Council may organise an event where the people from both sectors collaborate with their councillors and take forward a plan of action as to particular areas of interests. Some key areas to consider may include:

- Attracting talent and skills into the area
- Supporting entrepreneurs
- Encouraging access to the Town's facilities for meetings and training.
- More involvement by the business community
- Involvement with Syston Topic
- and any areas where the council is able to support and connect

We welcome anyone from business and the commercial sector in Syston to contact us to look at ways how we could work in the future and more importantly, how we could support each other to make Syston a bigger and better commercial hub for trade and business in the future.



The duration of the restriction is not anticipated to exceed a period of 2 days commencing on the 14th November 2023.


### <u>Memorial Park footpath to Fosse Way – Footpath L45, Syston - 13th November</u> 2023
